It is common for MATH 010 F students to master the first part of the course, but struggle with the second part. They earn a substandard grade in MATH 010 F, requiring them to retake the entire course. By dividing MATH 010 F into two parts, students that pass the first part (new MATH 004 F) will not have to retake the part they have mastered. On the other hand, MATH 010 F students who are unsuccessful with the first part of the course now spend the rest of the semester struggling with material they are not prepared for. By dividing MATH 010 F into two parts, students that do not pass the first part (new MATH 004 F) can repeat that course before attempting the second part (new MATH 006 F).
